

## Universal Licensing Recognition



Across the country, employers are desperate for workers, but many would-be workers face barriers to getting and filling empty jobs. Between 25 and 30 percent of all jobs require an occupational license, but these licenses and work experience are often not recognized when workers move to a different state. As a result, licensed workers are less likely to move, reducing mobility and limiting their economic opportunity. Varying standards between states force workers to pay high fees and can cause workers to lose out on wages during their transition, even resulting in unemployment or a shortage of workers. States should simplifying the licensing process for those who are moving by recognizing their licenses and work experience.

Voters support licensing reciprocity and recognition for workers who are relocating.

## What messages really move them? These messages work best.

- Thirty-seven states have licensing laws in place to benefit military spouses, many of whom relocate frequently and often struggle to find work as a result.
- With licensing reciprocity and recognition, workers would still be **required to go through any** required background checks.
- Workers would still be **held to the same standards and those workers already licensed** in states.
- There are a **record number of open jobs across the country** and employers are desperate to fill open jobs with workers.
- Occupational licensing reform could help prevent workers from falling into government dependency.
- Occupational licensing reform could provide more options for American consumers.
