Results for this poll are based on telephone interviews conducted among a nationwide sample of 503 business owners. Data for this survey research was collected by Cor Services, Inc.

Interviews were conducted via a computer-assisted telephone interviewing system utilizing techniques designed to achieve the highest possible respondent cooperation.

The surveys were conducted April 29-May 9, 2021. The margin of sampling error is plus or minus 4.37 percentage points. The margin of sampling error may be higher for certain subgroups. Results presented may not always appear to total 100 percent due to rounding.

Data was sampled using weighted demographic information from the U.S. Census Bureau's Survey of Business Owners and Self-Employed Persons, Statistics of U.S. Businesses, Annual Survey of Entrepreneurs, Current Population Survey, and state election authorities.
